Unwrapping Lazarus

What a joy it is to see people returning to worship. On Easter Sunday, I gazed out at the congregation and saw **many faces I hadn't seen in a year or more. It is hard to describe the joy I felt!**

I see that happening in our church. Every Sunday morning, the miracle of Lazarus is repeated as people return to worship. After a terrible year of isolation, the church is coming to life again. It is a quiet sort of miracle, but a miracle just the same.

For the past year, we have been isolated. Fear and anxiety have darkened our days. Cut off from family and friends, we have felt grief and sorrow. In some cases, Covid has caused death and injury.



Do you remember the story of Lazarus? For four days, Lazarus was dead and buried. Sealed up in a dark tomb, he was isolated, cut off from the living. But then, Jesus called out in a loud voice, **"Lazarus, come out!"**

I know that some of you have not returned to worship. Maybe your health is fragile. Maybe you are still waiting for the vaccine. Maybe you are being extra cautious for the sake of parents or grandparents. If you are not ready yet to come back to worship, I understand.

In response, **"The dead man came out his hands and feet wrapped with strips of linen, and a cloth around his face."** (John 11:44) What happened next is quite wonderful. **Jesus said to the crowd, "Take off the grave clothes and let him go."**

Only Jesus can raise people from death to life. However, our job is to *unwrap* them. If people are still frightened, we need to comfort them. If people are feeling anxious, we need to love, support and encourage them.

Can you imagine the joy when Lazarus was reunited with his family! And yet, he was still dressed in his grave clothes like a mummy. After four days in the tomb, it took loving hands to unwrap him.

Most of all, we need to be patient. It must have taken a long time to unwrap Lazarus from his grave clothes. In the same way, we need to be patient with those who are still feeling frightened. In his time, Jesus will call us to come out of the tomb.

The story of Lazarus is also our story. By his grace, Jesus speaks our name. He raises us from spiritual death to new life. He calls us to come out of the tomb, out of death and darkness.


- ✂ For Stephanie Poblenz as she starts work as our new Pastor of Family life and Pastoral Care.

The Session of LPC took the following actions at our April 19 monthly meeting:

- ✂ Approved new Covid guidelines, making face masks optional but still providing half of the Sanctuary for enforced social distancing for those who feel more cautious.
- ✂ Approved a recommendation from Personnel to hire Julie Crago as the new director of the LPC Playschool (the Playschool is a mission of our church that provides free preschool for 12 low-income students each year).
- ✂ Approved a request from Lelia Brandt to transfer her membership to Four Corners Community Church in West Chester.
- ✂ Approved a special Palm Sunday missions offering to be divided between **Joshua's Place and Matthew 25 Ministries (the offering raised \$3,650).**

Fields of Faith by Andrew Johnson

On Wednesday, April 14 students, parents and community members gathered together at VanDeGrift Stadium in Lebanon for an event put on by Lebanon High School's Fellowship of Christian Athlete Club called, *Fields of Faith*. Many of area youth groups and adults attended the event where we worshipped and heard testimonies from a number of high school students and teachers from our district. This marks the sixth fields of faith event for Lebanon FCA.



This year the focus was on knowing your purpose in Jesus Christ. Lebanon high school students shared testimonies about being called to live different lives than the world and to find your identity in Jesus Christ and not in other things like sports. A few district teachers shared God's word and direction with the gathered crowd. Junior high math teacher, JV basketball coach and LJHS FCA coordinator Josh Chasteen and LHJS varsity basketball coach, Nathan Chivington, challenged students to act on their faith they claim. Chasteen preached on Matthew 7:21-23 and challenged us to not be fake or pretend Christians. It was a powerful word. That night was bookended by worship songs led by a LHS science teacher and students including Grace Boyer who attends the 8:30 a.m. service and Vintage Sunday school.

Meet Nick Pierett from Lebanon High School

Andrew: What is your earliest religious memory?

Nick: Moving churches to go to LPC for church and preschool. Listening to Amazing Grace with my dad.

Andrew: How did you, as a child, view the God?

Nick: When I was 6 year old I saw God as a superhuman superhero like a Marvel movie.

Andrew: How do you view God now?

Nick: God is super loving and with you through the hardships. He's always there even when it doesn't feel like it I can trust that He's always there. God is an almighty and loving father. No matter what you do Jesus loves you. He's my Savior. God's like your real father. He is all knowing and has a plan and purpose for my life. I'm called to use my gifts for His kingdom.

Andrew: What experiences or events have been turning points in your life and why?

When I got my knee injury in 7th it was pretty hard. I questioned a lot of stuff. I trusted God but I also questioned what was happening to me. I kind of realized there was more to me than basketball.

Andrew: What questions would you like to ask God?

Nick: I know a lot of people who don't know God or don't believe that he's real. I want to ask Him why He doesn't show Himself more so there could be no doubt that He is real.

Andrew: What are you going to do next year?

Nick: I'm not really sure where I'll end up for school. I've still got some options and things to decide. I'd like to study to be a teacher or study business and sports management. I'd like to be a coach or an athletic director but I'm not sure. I'd like to be a teacher and a coach or a high school athletic director. I want to be a role model for kids and help them in their lives.

Andrew: Who is the most influential person in your spiritual life right now?

Nick: Probably my youth pastor Andrew Johnson or my best friend Blake Lamb. Blake has been through a lot of the same situations I have and he always gives me Bible verses and songs to get me back on the right track.

Andrew: What Impact does your faith have on your social behavior?

Nick: I watch what I say and do. Lots of people know I'm a Christian and I want to represent Christ to the world.

Andrew: When I die I will probably wish that I had...

Nick: Spent more time with my family. I'm about to head off to college somewhere and I think about how much I'm going to miss my family.

See A Need - Fill A Need

In the movie *Robots* (go see it if you haven't), the company motto for BigWeld Industries is *See a Need – Fill a Need*. They don't exist to make money - they exist to make life better for everyone. This idea is part of what we are called to do and be as Christians. To be useful to the kingdom, to meet the needs of others. This church is filled with real life examples of this and one person living that out is Rachel Jaynes. Early on, Rachel saw a need in The Crew and she filled it with great love for the ministry and a passion to serve this flock. She has been a selfless and crucial part of the live stream ministry. I asked Rachel about serving on The Crew and she said - **"One of the things that has been really cool about being involved with the crew is seeing just how much goes into making Sunday services (it's a lot!). It gives me an even greater appreciation for our wonderful staff and how dedicated they are to serving our congregation and using their unique talents and gifts for the glory of God."**



Now Rachel is seeing another need which she feels called to pursue. This month, she will begin teaching the 3-5 grade Sunday School class. **"I'm really looking forward to working with the 3-5 grade age group. It's such a wonderful time in life, because you're starting to explore and form your own ideas and opinions about the world, and I feel very privileged to help them discover Jesus on a personal level, and can't wait to see how He is calling them to discover His love and to participate in His plan for the world."** Said Rachel. And although we are losing a key member of The Crew, we support her as she follows God's leading and are excited for what The Lord has in store for her and the students she will be working with.

She did not come to this decision lightly. It was only after much prayer and counsel that she made this decision. I asked her what she will miss about serving on the Crew and she had this to say. **"I think what I'll miss most about being on the crew is being able to serve our congregation in a very integral way. Many of our members are still worshipping from home, and being part of making the service available to them is really important to me. I remember how much of a lifeline the live stream services were to me during the early stages of the pandemic, and I've been grateful for the opportunity to give back."** We thank God for Rachel and her servant heart. Please keep her in your prayers as she makes this transition in ministry.

Now it's your turn to follow BigWeld's lead to see a need and fill it. First, let's look at the need. Beginning in May, we will no longer have enough crew members to appropriately fill every position needed to be effective in the live stream ministry. We might be able to get by for a while, but this will inevitably lead to volunteer burnout and the loss of more Crew members. I think it safe to say that no one reading this would want that to happen. Now, here's how we as a church can fill the need. Easy answer – volunteer! More to the point, we are asking at least (with great emphasis on "at least") one person from each worship service to volunteer to serve on The Crew. It is a vital ministry of the church which serves everyone who worships at LPC, either in person or via live stream. We are praying to have enough people join The Crew, from each service, to create a rotation where crew members do not have to serve week in and week out. So, over the coming weeks, we will be asking you to prayerfully consider serving God by serving your church family as a member of The Crew. It is an exciting, fun way to serve and the learning process makes it easy for you to get plugged in.
