

Five Reasons for Giving

In many churches, the pastor is always begging for money. People are guilted into giving with high pressure tactics and frantic appeals.

I remember a famous TV preacher who said to his congregation, "If you don't give, God is going to take me home!" As a newspaper reporter, I actually covered that story and it made me cringe.

At LPC, we don't beg for money. However, I do preach about stewardship. The Bible has a lot to say about how we spend our money. Jesus often spoke about wealth, greed and generosity. How we spend our money is a direct reflection of our spiritual health. Why should we give? I believe there are five main reasons.



1. We give out of love. It's been said that you can give without loving but you can never love without giving. That is so true. If you really love God, it will make you generous – it is an expression of our love.

2. We give out of gratitude. The reason why I give to God is because God has given so much to me! This includes my eternal salvation, my family, this amazing church, my life, my health, my home, my wealth and the beauty of creation. In so many ways, God has blessed us. If you count your blessings, it will make you generous.

3. We give out of loyalty. Many people today drift from church to church. They feel no love or loyalty. They are like shoppers, restlessly searching for the best bargain. If something upsets them, they head for the exit. This is a sad and selfish way to live your life. As followers of Jesus, we should feel a deep loyalty to the church – this place where we were baptized, married

and buried. The bond of love should be unbreakable. If you are loyal to the church, you will give generously.

4. We give to a mission. The church is not a social club where we gather with friends. As followers of Jesus, we have a God-given mission. Our mission is to make Christ known, beginning with our neighbors and ex-

tending to the far corners of the globe – in Mongolia, Africa, Siberia and India. It's been said that the church exists for mission as a fire exists for burning. A church that only exists for itself is a sad contradiction! Here at LPC, we are a mission-driven church. In countless ways, I see all of you passionately pursuing that mission. Some of you are feeding the hungry. Some of you donated clothing to Ukraine refugees. Some of you have worked with our Afghan refugees to make them feel loved and welcome. Some of you travelled to inner-city Detroit to see the basketball court

we built in partnership with 5-Point-7 Church. Some of you created quilts for homeless children. Some of you served meals to grieving families through the ministry of our deacons.

5. We give out of faith. If we had all the money in the world, giving would be easy. It would cost us nothing. However, for most of us giving is not that easy. Our resources are limited. We have bills to pay, medical needs and kids to put through college. When we give to God, it is an act of faith. In a powerful way, we are trusting God with our finances. We are trusting that God will care and provide for us.

In this season of giving, I hope you will give generously. Not out of guilt, but out of love, loyalty and gratitude.

As many of you know, LPC's Reach Out team has adopted the Warren County Career Center for this school year. The goal of adopting the Career Center was to build relationships with the school, their faculty and students, in a "no strings attached" way. The team wanted to be able to come alongside the school and meet any sort of need they may have, as well as celebrate all the staff is doing there to support the students and our community.

One of the biggest needs the school made known to us was their food pantry. The school offers a pantry for students at no cost where they can come in a grab breakfast before classes, or a quick bite as they head off directly from school to work. The school has identified several students who are either homeless, or couch surfing at their friend's homes, who all utilize the food pantry. The local food banks are currently also in need, and therefore could not help with stocking the WCCC's pantry. Which is where our amazing congregation stepped in.

The Reach Out team put a call out to the congregation to donate specific food items that are easy to eat, and that the students

would actually eat, and we only gave you one week to do it! The response that we received was amazing. Our congregation once again stepped up in a way that we could have never imagined! We had almost 10 giant boxes of food to donate to the school. Half of what we received is pictured here. When we went to deliver the food to WCCC, the staff who



were present were speechless. One even said to me, "we heard we were getting food, but we never expected our kids to be loved like this!"

It is such a blessing to be a part of a congregation who loves its community.

We have seen time and time again our congregation step up when a need has been made known, all out of the overflow of God's love for us. My prayer is that as we build relationships with those individuals outside our church family, we would have opportunities to share the Gospel with them. That people would see that LPC is not just a church that exists for our own church family, but we exist to spread God's love to everyone. Thank you to everyone who donated to our food drive! You have made a great impact on many teenagers lives, as well as the staff at Warren County Career Center.

Again, it sounds and looks fantastic! There are hundreds of sounds available to use at the touch of a button. Also, the technology in this kit far surpasses its predecessor. This provides a musical experience which is inspiring, not only for the drummer, but for the entire band. Everyone in the praise band, is positively impacted and, in turn, so is the worshippers who attend the 11 a.m. service. I am so thankful for our donor, our drummers, this band and crew, and for this amazing fellowship at LPC!

Read the Bible IN A YEAR



Chris Earnhart will lead our November 10 discussion on *Station Eleven* by Canadian author Emily St. John Mandel. The novel takes place in the Great Lakes region before and after a fictional swine flu pandemic known as the "Georgia Flu", has devastated the world, killing most of the population. The book was published in 2014, and won the Arthur C. Clarke Award the following year. The author follows the lives of survivors, tracing how their lives intersect in a group of entertainers called the Traveling Symphony. The thread that connects their stories is Arthur Leander, an aging Hollywood star who – on the same night that the plague began destroying civilization – was trying to reboot his career. We jump back and forth in time, watching how his life influenced what happens to the band of survivors.



Holy Echos

I'm so excited to share this with you. God is moving at LPC! This month, there has been a reverberating message that God has been sending out to the children at LPC. Listen to this...

At WNT Engage 56, after studying about how God saved Shadrach and his friends from the fiery furnace, the group had a discussion come up about miracles. The kids wondered if God still does miracles today. What was awesome about this conversation was that the kids began to share miracles that they had witnessed. They talked about the miracle and beauty seen in nature. Many gave examples of people who had been really sick, but then had gotten better. One of them, Allie Rachedi, shared about their elderly neighbor who had cancer and was moved to hospice. After spending about a week in hospice, he started to feel better, and when the doctors scanned him again, his cancer was gone. He lived another 10 years after that! The kids decided that God is still doing miracles, but sometimes people don't recognize or give Him credit for them. The kids really got the point that God is real and at work in our lives.



This discussion happened without the knowledge of Heather Forster, who prepared and led a devotion with Engage 56 when they had their trip to Magic Castle Mini Golf this month. Her devotion was on Psalm 19:1. We talked about how our feelings can lead us astray sometimes, and about how the Bible tells us that God is real, even when we don't feel like He is, all we have to do is look at His creation. Heather said, "Think of it this way. There are days when you're busy and don't see many of your friends. Maybe you had an early morning practice, or classes, and then had to

run home fast after school. As a result, you didn't get to see, feel, or talk to your friends. That doesn't mean that your friends aren't your friends anymore because you didn't have any contact with them today." She then made the point that the same is true with God. God is real, regardless of how we are feeling at any given moment, and He is always there for us.

Oh, and then at WNT Kids, we have been studying the Armor of God. We have talked about how God is the only real source of truth, not our feelings (there it is again) and not any other "expert." We find His truth in the Bible, which we should surround ourselves with and which holds our lives together (Belt of Truth). We discussed how God wants us to give Him, and only Him, our whole hearts and what this looks like as we live our lives (Breastplate of Righteousness). We also talked about why it is so important to share about Jesus, His love, and the message of salvation (shoes of peace). We need to make sure that others don't miss out because Jesus is the only way to heaven.

Then, catch this, during Sunday School, we have been discussing sin and why we need Jesus and salvation. At one point in the third and fourth grade class, a story was shared about how someone was praying and in their prayer, they said that they knew that God was a loving God and that He would accept them into heaven even if they didn't specifically accept Jesus and follow Him. As this was said, the kids' eyes got wider and wider, and Aaron Johnson repeatedly said, "That's not right. That's not true." This was the beginning of a great discussion about Jesus being the only way into heaven, and how it is so important to share about Him with others so that they don't miss out. After we talked, Aaron said, "That would make a great mythbuster sermon...how there are other ways to get to heaven."

Well, guess what we didn't know? Aaron's dad was al-

ready slated with preaching on that very thing. His sermon title was, "One Way." (I know, your jaw has fully dropped now, right?)

It's so amazing to me to watch God weave this very important message together through so many strands of the church's ministry... Children, God is real and He loves you and is at work in your lives still today. He is truth and you can find His truth in the Bible. Jesus wants you to follow Him and only Him because He is the only way to the Father. Also, because Jesus is the only way, it is so important once you decide to follow Him, that you tell others about Him and The Way, so that they are not lost.




Activating God Space

Judy said she would Google the information Becky had shared and plans on visiting LPC for a traditional service. Turns out, Judy had moved to the community about a year ago after the death of her husband. Judy is looking for an environment of friendship and acceptance, as well as a church with traditional worship.

Becky is a picture of how simply caring about people and entering into conversation with them can open the door for a God conversation. You never know where that may take you. May we all glorify God in our daily lives like Becky does!


- For the Nominating Committee as they seek Christ-like men and women to serve as Elders and Deacons.
