Casting Our Nets

Put out into deep water, and let down your nets for a catch. - Luke 5:4

Jesus calls us to be fishers of men — actively sharing our faith and capturing men and women with the good news of salvation. This isn't optional — it is the duty of every disciple.

The question is: how do we go fishing in this modern age when the fish are not biting? There was a time

not long ago when we knocked on doors, handed out tracts, advertised in the Yellow Pages or displayed our faith on bumper stickers. Today, these methods are not effective and would probably frighten people away.

The best way to share our faith is by building relationships with people we already know. Invite them to coffee.

Start a conversation. Ask them what they believe and listen prayerfully. Instead of blurting out answers, follow up with questions. When we truly listen, the result can be life-changing.

Another way is through the internet. In our world today, the internet has become the main form of social interaction. Unfortunately, people spend more time on their screens than they do interacting with actual people.

For this reason, it essential that we share our faith through social media. Just as the disciples used fishing nets, we need to use the internet. When people ask spiritual questions today, they turn to Google. When people are looking for a church, they do it by live-streaming before making an actual visit. How do we adapt to this new reality?



In January, our church received a \$7,000 grant from Midwest Presbytery to expand our digital outreach. This might seem like a lot of money but actually, there are churches that spend millions on digital media. Rachel Guerin, an LPC member who works professionally in digital marketing, has volunteered her time to help us launch a

one-year campaign. She is an expert in this field with a lot of experience and creative ideas.

I am excited to see what Rachel will do. In the meantime, we need your help.

When you see the church post something on Face-book or you watch live streaming on YouTube, please share it with others! This is very simple – it only takes

a mouse click. However, if all of us did this it would expand our digital outreach by thousands of views, I am sure.

It costs nothing and it may have an eternal impact on someone you love.

In this dark world, we need to share the light of Christ. The need is greater than ever.



6) How can we as a church be praying for you?


A. Patience! There are a couple of situations in my life that I could use an extra helping of grace and patience, so that would be greatly appreciated.

Meet Our New Organist!

After months of searching, I am delighted to introduce you to LPC's new Organist, Leslie Catchpole.

Many of you know Leslie already. For those who don't, here's a conversation I recently had with her after she accepted the position.

RM: First, let me say congratulations! I know many people in the flock know you. Still I thought it would be a good idea to give us all the opportunity to get to know you a little better, so thanks for taking time to do this. What was your first introduction to LPC?

LC: 1988. My husband Tom grew up in the church. His parents sang in the choir and dad played violin in the church. He even served as Organist, Choir and Children's Choir director for a time.

RM: When did you first start playing the organ?

LC: I began playing the organ at age 11. My mother, who was also an organist, said when I could reach the pedals with my feet, I could learn to play. I learned on a Tracker organ built in 1903 at The First Baptist Church.

RM: You've served as organist here before, right?

LC: Yes. I was LPC'S organist from 1988 to 2002.

RM: What do you think about the organ here at church?

RM: Is there something particular about it that inspires you to play?

LC: This may sound odd but it just feels like home. Music is

such a huge part of my life. Having the opportunity to play such an amazing instrument is so exciting! It brings me so much joy to be back home!

RM: Tell me about your feelings on being a worship leader at the organ.

LC: The organist is such a vital part of leading worship. Churches in general have changed so much over the years. Many have gone to praise bands or leading from a piano. But in my opinion the organ, just as any other instrument, is vital in helping lead worship. As it says in one of my favorite scriptures, "Shout for joy, to the Lord, all the earth, burst into jubilant song with music, make music to the Lord with the harp and the sound of singing, with trumpets and the blast of the ram's horn-shout for joy before the Lord, the King!" It's an amazing privilege and honor to be called into this position at LPC. God had placed this on my heart as a child. I'm humbled to have this opportunity to share it with LPC.

RM: I know you've wanted to serve in this position for a while. What are you most looking forward to in your role as Organist?

LC: It has always in my heart to possibly come back to LPC if the opportunity came about. But God had other plans for me. He's had me in training. He's better equipped me for such a time as this at LPC. I'm so thrilled and excited to see what God has in store for His kingdom.

Encounter Leadership Retreat: A Discipleship Training Event

We are excited to share with you our recent Encounter Leadership Retreat held on February 24th and 25th at Camp Lebanon in Lebanon, Ohio. This event was a discipleship training retreat for our Wednesday night leadership group, consisting of high school student leaders who are juniors and seniors, college students, and adults. Our goal for this retreat was to equip our leaders with the tools they need to disciple others and to encourage them to be intentional about fostering discipleship relationships with our students.

The retreat was packed with sessions focusing on the discipleship process. This process included building meaningful relationships, sharing your story, asking intentional questions, life applications with accountability, discipleship responsibilities, sharing life through contact work, planning, and future vision. Our training emphasized that discipleship is the process of multiplication through relationships, which is a follower of Christ and walking in obedience to His commands.

Our leaders also learned that small groups

do not equal discipleship and that discipleship does not only happen through programming or when students come to church. Instead, they were reminded that discipleship happens through relationships at home and through intentional relationships at church.

During the retreat, our leaders also learned how to disciple a student, and they discovered some common misconceptions about discipleship. We discussed several Bible verses that reveal the biblical basis for discipleship, including Matthew 16:24, Matthew 28:18-20, and John 13:14-15.

We believe that our leaders are now better equipped to disciple others and that our students will benefit greatly from the intentional relationships that will be fostered through this retreat. We invite you to join us as we continue to focus on building intentional discipleship relationships with our students and to share life and the Gospel with them (1 Thessalonians 2:8). Together, we can work to build a stronger community of disciples who are committed to following Christ and making disciples.

Dinners For Eight




