Finding the Onramp

remember once driving in Seattle and getting hopelessly lost. I could see the interstate highway right next to me, but I couldn't find an onramp (this was before GPS). It was frustrating!

Sometimes the church is like that. Visitors come to worship. They are greeted warmly. They love the

preaching and music, and yet, they can't find the onramp. A year or two later, they still feel like strangers and outsiders.

I remember a woman who told me she was leaving the church. She said, "Pastor, I've been here three years and I still don't have any friends." That is hard to believe, I know. However, when people can't find the onramp, they usually head for the exit ramp.

There are many onramps at LPC. Our new members class (held two or three times a year) is designed to greet new people. We encourage them to get involved in Sunday School,

weekly Bible studies, or Wednesday Nights Together. Also, we encourage them to serve in the feeding ministry, work with children or join the choir or praise band.

And yet, I believe we need to build more onramps. One way we are doing that is Prime Timers, a fellowship group for adults who are 60 and over. Prime Timers shut down during Covid, but we're planning

to start up again in July with food, a cornhole tournament and game night at the church. The group is planning to meet bi-monthly and singles are welcome.

Also, we're planning a Sunday brunch for new visitors. The brunch will be held Sunday, August 13, at the home of Pastor Peter and Beth Larson. It's an op-

portunity to get to know our pastors and church staff and meet each other.

Also, we have Dinners for Eight, where people gather in someone's home for dinner and conversation. It seems like a small thing, I know. However, breaking bread together is a radical act of hospitality that was practiced by Jesus himself.

Of course, the best onramp is not a church program. It is personal. It's when we meet new people and invite them over for coffee or a meal. It's when we meet a new visitor and say, "What are you doing after church?" or, "I'd love to

see your flower garden!"

and I love Dolly Sods Wilderness Area. It has the most beautiful campground I have ever seen. It's perfect for swimming and hiking around.


Q - What are you looking forward to most about this role?



Activating God Space A.K.A. SHARING THE GOOD NEWS

This month, Ron Warncke is writing about how The Gideons create God Space by GOING IN TO ALL THE WORLD.

Recently my Gideon colleagues and I started a Bible study at Warren Correctional Institution, one of the two state prisons on Highway 63. I am also a member of the Kairos team at Lebanon Correctional, which is adjacent to WCI. For a number of years, I have been a member of various jail and prison ministries.



Corwin Nixon, the famous local politician, had a dislike for prisons, seeing them as places where lives were wasting away as well as a lot of money being spent. He felt society in general

should be doing more to train young people to be good citizens. He often said, if you want to keep your boys out of prison, have them join the Boy Scouts! I would also add that it would be quite useful to have them join a youth group such as the one conducted by Stephanie and Andrew.

But the reality is that we have to have prisons and there are people incarcerated who desperately need to know the Lord. I firmly believe that everyone, even gross criminals (think thief on the cross) deserve to hear the good news of Jesus Christ. My personal experience in prison ministries has been nothing short of phenomenal. When you begin in these ministries, you cannot believe what you observe. You meet inmates who are truly born again and love the Lord. Many of them study the Word diligently, and keep you on your toes in terms of properly preparing before you come to their institution. Many of them lead Bible studies themselves in their dormitories/cell blocks and often lead people to the Lord. They are always kind and gracious, and thank us profusely for coming. As Jesus said, "I will in no way cast out anyone who comes unto me". So believe it or not, there are some fine Christians in prisons and jails.

There of course are many that don't know the Lord, but need to. We encourage the guys to witness to them and bring them to our study! The really interesting thing is that many of them will tell you that the best thing that ever happened to them was being incarcerated, as it was the means whereby they met the Savior. Many of them believe that if they had not come to prison, they would be dead, a victim of gang violence or a drug deal gone bad. So indeed, the Lord works in mysterious ways, ways that we don't always understand.

One thing that is common in almost all of their lives is that they came from a fatherless or broken home. Those that think a father and a stable home are not important need to visit a prison! I sincerely hope I have helped you understand the unique Gospel opportunities a prison ministry affords. The next time you drive by the prisons on 63, remember to think to yourself there are brothers there that need to be prayed for.

TWISTS AND TURNS VERSE FOR THE WEEK:

"Make your ways known to me, Lord; teach me your paths." -Psalm 25:4

Please pray for VBS:

- Pray for God to be in the details and that all of the planning for VBS will be guided by Him.
- Pray that God would send all the volunteers needed for a fun and fruitful VBS.
- Pray that many children will come to our VBS and that the signup process will be smooth and easy for parents and staff.
- Pray for God to guard the health and safety of all volunteers, church staff, and children coming to VBS.
- Pray that every day of VBS will run smoothly.
- Pray for sunny skies at VBS, especially on Friday night, so that we can have our outdoor ending celebration as planned.
- Pray that new families will start coming to LPC as a result of VBS.

SPECIFIC PRAYERS FOR THE WEEK OF VBS:

Monday, June 12: Jesus is holy and that changes everything!

VOLUNTEERS: Pray that our volunteers come to VBS fully prepared and energized. Pray that they will come ready to show Jesus and his love to the children they are with each night.

CHILDREN: Pray that the children will understand that Jesus is God's son and He is holy and sinless; perfect.

FAMILIES: Pray that each child's parents/family members would ask their child about what they are learning at VBS and that they would yield to the Holy Spirit as He stirs them to further discuss each night's VBS lesson.

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Loving Our Neighbors— Lebanon Food Pantry (LFP)

"Give us this day our daily bread." (Matt. 6:11) We may not give much thought to this part of our Lord's Prayer, but it certainly resonates with a growing number of Warren County residents the LFP serves. In fact, we now assist 40% more individuals and families than we did last year and the fastest growing segment is seniors, those 60+. At the same time, federally funded food is in short supply. LFP is the only area pantry staffed and financially supported by 14 local congregations including LPC and our Missions Team.

You can help our neighbors by collecting canned goods or shelf-stable items and dropping them off in the bin in the Welcome Center. You can also take them directly to the pantry at 190 New Street next to the post office during operating hours which are Monday, Wednesday and Friday, 9 a.m. - noon and 6-8 p.m. on Wednesday.


Folks often wonder what items are most needed. While we are able to get a number of items from Shared Harvest Food Bank, we typically have to buy the following items.

- Canned Soup, fruit, or vegetables Sugar
- Rice
- Mac & Cheese
- Breakfast Cereal
- Ground Coffee
- Saltine Crackers
- Graham Crackers

- Cooking Oil
- Dish Liquid
- Bar Soap
- Deodorant
- Shampoo
- Conditioner




