Wonderfully Made

For you created me in my inmost being; you formed me in my mother's womb. I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made. -Psalm 139:13-14

We are living in an age of sexual chaos and confusion. Like an earthquake, it has shaken the church to its foundations.

There are men who identify as women. There are women who identify as men. There are people who claim to be "non-binary," meaning they have no gender at all. Same-sex marriages, once forbidden, are now legal.

In recent years, we have witnessed the rise of the transgender movement. Many teenagers are undergoing irreversible surgery and hormone therapies in a futile attempt to change their gender. For some, this has caused physical and emotional trauma.

It's easy to blame gay or transgendered people. However, the issue is much larger than that. Approximately 37 percent of all marriages end in divorce. Sex outside of marriage is considered the norm in our hookup culture. The internet is flooded with pornography that is accessible to children.

As followers of Jesus, how do we address this crisis? Unfortunately, some churches react with hatred and condemnation. Of course, that doesn't help. Jesus didn't come into the world to condemn us, but to save us. An-

ger and hatred doesn't help or heal anyone.

In other churches, they choose to remain silent. They are afraid of controversy or offending someone. However, the church must not remain silent. If we truly care about people, we must speak God's truth with love and compassion. What is urgently needed today is for the church to address these issues with grace and humility, recogniz-

ing that all of us have struggled with our sexuality. Instead of reacting in anger and hatred, the church needs to proclaim a positive message about human sexuality.

The Bible is the owner's manual — it tells us how our bodies are designed to function. Our sexuality is a won-

derful gift. When we follow God's design, it brings life and joy.

However, when we abuse this gift, it causes pain, lone-liness and brokenness. From the AIDS epidemic to the evil of abortion, sexual sin has caused great devastation. It's like a freight train that has gone off the rails. As a pastor, I have seen many lives and families wrecked and ruined by sexual sin and it breaks my heart.

On Wednesday, September 13 I will begin teaching a 12-week class, "Wonderfully Made." Together, we will explore what the Bible says about sexuality and our bodies. The class will include video testimonies of men and women who have experienced healing and transformation. These issues are controversial. For some of us, they are personal. However, my prayer is that we will discuss them honestly and openly, without shame, guilt or embarrassment.

We are living in a time of great darkness. However, you don't get rid of darkness by condemning it. What we need is light. Jesus is the light that shines in the darkness, healing and restoring lost sinners. I encourage you to join us by attending this important class.

ADULT CLASSES

Sept. 13 - Nov. 15, 6:30 - 8 p.m.

Wonderfully Made

What does the Bible say about the human body? As Christians, how do we respond to people who claim to be gay, lesbian, bisexual or transexual? In this class, we will explore what the Bible says about human sexuality and how we can speak the truth in love to people who are struggling with their sexual identity. Pastor Peter Larson will be teaching the class, using a video series and other teaching materials. The class is free. Led by Pastor Peter Larson.

Knowing Scripture

Every Christian has the privilege and duty to diligently study God's Word. Dr. R.C. Sproul's book, *Knowing Scripture* and its accompanying video series will guide our study. We'll learn numerous helps for personal Bible study through basic, foundational principles of biblical interpretation. Dr. Sproul offers several pitfalls to avoid and clear explanations of eleven basic steps of interpretation and simple how-to's for using them. It's important we improve our skills of interpretation because accompanying our privilege to study, is our responsibility to interpret correctly. This is a basic introductory course in hermeneutics or the science of biblical interpretation for lay people, not seminarians! Led by Steve Newby.

The Sermon on the Mount: Life in the Kingdom

A study of chapters 5, 6, and 7 of Matthew's gospel, the Sermon on the Mount. Christ's clarion call to life in the Kingdom provides teachings about the hallmarks of the Christian character, the deeper implications of God's law, the righteous acts of giving and prayer, and the solid foundations of faith that guide the relationships among believers. Facilitated by Nina Dorsch, our primary text is Matthew's gospel; *The Sermon on the Mount* by Sinclair Ferguson is an optional resource.

The Marriage School (6:30 - 8:30 p.m.)

Why doesn't marriage, our most intense lifelong relationship, come with a manual? We want our marriages to glorify God, but what does that really look like? We know God calls us to love and respect our spouse, but we need some practical steps to get there. The Marriage School offers The Third Option a 14-week relationship skills course that helps couples build stronger, healthier marriages. This course is for healthy couples who want to grow stronger, committed couples who suffer from conflict or miscommunication, and couples who are in crisis. The class includes discussion, teaching and testimony. Cost: \$420 with partial and full scholarships available (free to LPC families). Led by Daniel and Rachel Sachs.

Streams in the Desert: MISSION TEAM TRAVELS TO KENYA

In July our church sent a mission team to Kenya, East Africa, to visit some of our mission projects. During the 9-day trip they visited Saint Andrew's Presbyterian Church in Nairobi and delivered 55 pounds of beads and a supply of yarn to the Women's Guild. The beads and yarn will be used for making wool clothing and jewelry to support the Tumaini Home for at-risk children.

The following day we visited the village of Ilmamen where our church helped to drill a well 13 years ago that supplies fresh drinking water for people, livestock and growing vegetables. The well has transformed the village and resulted in people coming to faith in Christ and joining the church.

One of the highlights was worshiping with the Masai people in their colorful robes and beaded jewelry. We sang, danced and praised God together, our hearts overflowing with love and joy. Pastor Peter Larson preached a message that was translated into Swahili. His sermon was taken from Isaiah 41:17-20 where it says that the Messiah will make streams appear in the desert.

After worship we dedicated the school that was built with funds from LPC. The school has two buildings of classrooms and an administrative building that provides an office for the principal, a library and a room where teachers can meet. It was a joy to meet the 150 students and their teachers. After the dedication we enjoyed a lunch of goat stew, including the goat eyeballs. Also, we delivered 50 pocket New Testaments donated by Ron Warncke and the Gideon Society of Warren County.

Another highlight was visiting the village of Kibini, where we hosted a games day in partnership with college students from St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church. We were expecting 300 children but 540 showed up, some of them walking for miles to get there. It was an unforgettable day of joy, love and laughter.

The trip ended with a Safari to the Masai Mara Game Preserve where we saw elephants, zebras, giraffes, lion, cheetah, leopard, warthogs, wildebeest, gazelles and hyenas. In awe, we marveled at the beauty of God's creation.

The trip was a mountaintop experience for all of us and we are grateful for all of your prayers and financial support. The trip reminded us that to send money is not enough – we need to go in person to share the love of Christ.

Do you have family members that don't yet know Jesus? I think probably we all have someone – children, grandchildren, brothers, sisters, parents. We ache for them to know the peace and joy that comes with trusting in Jesus. We watch them struggle with anxiety. We watch them run after the things that don't satisfy. And we yearn to see them turn to Jesus.

The author of God Space, Doug Pollock, taught a workshop at LPC in 2020 for the winter WNT session. It opened up a whole new world for me! Prior to that, I thought evangelism was for someone who was outgoing, could rattle off chunks of scripture, and knew exactly what to say. Not me!


But ever since that workshop, I have been trying to put what he taught into practice. Am I like Doug Pollock? Not even close! Has it made a difference? Yes! But now I put that in God's hands and listen to what they are saying. I ask questions about what they're doing and feeling. Sometimes, God opens a door to talk about him. But I try to keep it brief. I'm trying to let God lead. I'm not very good at it, but amazingly, God is blessing my efforts!

Many of you may not have been here when we had the workshop, or were not able to attend it. If you have loved ones that you long to see come to Jesus, I urge you to get a copy of God Space and read it, or better yet, gather with a couple of friends and read it together and encourage each other.



LPC Special Music

WHY HAVE SPECIAL MUSIC?

At LPC, we take time to prepare our hearts for worship during the prelude. The prelude is an opportunity to quiet our minds and souls to intentionally focus on worship: "Be still and know that I am God" (Psalm 46:10). Offertories provide time to reflect on giving. Postludes are a "sending out" to take Christ's message to the world.

Special music is not for entertainment or to display exceptional technique but to provide times to intentionally focus on worship.

HOW DO I CHOOSE MUSIC?

Insight for choosing a song:

Ask yourself, what message will it communicate? Common questions include: Is it good music? Is it suitable for the use to which it is to be put? Will it draw attention to me, or will it tend to induce the proper worshipful, reverent mood? Please choose traditional songs that are familiar including an anthem, hymn, psalm, testimonial, and or encouragement. Songs should be inspiring, uplifting, and Christ centered including songs about faith, prayer, and the Word of God. Seasonal music may differ in purpose and mood.

Prelude: The music should typically be short (2-3 minutes), uplifting, and encouraging. Because preludes are designed to help prepare our hearts and minds for worship, there is a preference for melodies that are familiar so the people can easily relate. For example, renditions of familiar hymns help the listener to quickly relate and prepare for worship. Instrumental music should be assessed on the propriety of its use in worship.

Offertory: The music should be approximately 3-4 minutes, meditative, and can be themed to the pastor's message.

Postlude: Like the prelude, the music should typically be short (2-3 minutes), uplifting, and encouraging as the church service concludes.

Senior Pastor Search Committee Update

The Senior Pastor Search Committee has been very busy over the summer seeking candidates to follow Peter as our next Senior Pastor. With a very limited availability of pastoral candidates due to high retirements, our committee has been on the recruiting trail versus waiting for candidates to find us. We have contacted both EPC large and mid-size church networks, made contact with ECO resources and we asked Stephanie to advertise our opening at the General Assembly meeting in June.

In June, our eight members started to research church websites in the 8 Presbyteries surrounding the Midwest Presbytery. We reviewed every church for similarities to LPC, and if we saw a promising pastor, we listened to their online sermons. If a member was impressed with their sermon, we asked another committee member to listen as well. If two of our members were impressed with the sermon, we would then contact the pastor to invite them to an exploratory phone call. This process led to reviewing over 400 church websites, listening to ~ 200 online sermons, sending invites to 22 pastors for phone conversations and we have conducted phone conversations with 6 candidates. Three of these phone conversations led to candidates applying for our position.

To date, nine pastors have applied for our position. After diligently reviewing these applications, our committee has determined that seven of the candidates do not meet our qualification standards. But for the exciting news, we did conduct an interview for one of the top qualified applicants on 8/16 (just before the Chronicle deadline). An interesting point about this EPC pastor is that he approached Stephanie after hearing her talk at the GA. Thank you Stephanie!! We also have another qualified candidate that we will consider interviewing.

Patience, perseverance, and prayer has been prevalent with our committee over the last 8 months. And we appreciate learning that many of you are praying for us and the persons who apply to be our next senior pastor. We are so grateful to Peter for his willingness and flexibility to shepherd all of us until we find the next senior pastor that God is calling to LPC.

He will now teach at the post-doctorate level, while also conducting cancer research using some of the plants known to the indigenous Maya. All of this would not have been possible without the church's continued support and encouragement through the years, especially regarding my late father's (Rev. Sixto Castillo) vision of Mahanaim. We want to thank the LPC Mexico Mission team especially Inga, Ruth, Mike, and Ellen for their friendship and leadership over more than 25 years.


- For the Pastor Nominating Committee as they continue the search for a new Senior Pastor, that God give them discernment and patience.

Session Report

The Session of LPC took the following actions at our August 21 monthly meeting:

- Approved John Morris, Cindy Jaynes and Brad Heath as elder commissioners to the Sept. 15-16 meeting of Midwest Presbytery in Warsaw, Indiana.
- Received a report from the Finance Ministry Team that income through July 30 was \$788,000 and expenses were \$756,000, which puts us \$32,000 ahead of expenses.
- Approved a motion to cancel the 10 a.m. worship service on Sunday, Sept. 10 due to the Kickoff Breakfast.
- Approved a motion to serve communion at the Women's Retreat on Saturday, September 30.
- Approved \$4,625 to cover additional architectural fees as we continue to pursue plans for our West Campus properties.
- Approved a motion authorizing Neil Tunison to work with the architect and City of Lebanon to consolidate our property (on the West side of the campus) and vacate the current alleys associated with existing lots.
- Approved a recommendation to create a standing Family Ministry Team to focus on reaching young families with children.
