Thanks be to God for his indescribable gift! - 2 Corinthians 9:15

Some people are cheap. Others are generous. But some are beyond generous.

A friend of mine was meeting with his accountant to go over his tax returns. When they got to his deductions, the accountant was stunned. "Why are you giving away so much money?" the accountant asked in disbelief. "I've never seen anyone who was this generous!"

My friend is not a tech billionaire. He is a college professor who receives a monthly paycheck. He lives frugally. He doesn't own a big house or fancy car. And yet, he gives a huge percentage

of his income to support his church and to help those in need. My friend isn't just generous, he is beyond generous.

When I was a pastor in Indianapolis, Beth and I were invited to dinner by an elderly couple in our church. After dinner, they brought out two silver candelabra and an intricate flower holder. "We bought these at the silver vaults in London, and

we want you to have them," they explained.

Beth and I were speechless. The gift was priceless. Probably, it was the most valuable thing they owned. We had done nothing to deserve such a gift. It was beyond generous — an act of reckless extravagance. Today, those candelabra sit on our dining room table, a constant reminder of God's grace in our lives.

Why are some people so generous? It has nothing to do with our income level. It has everything to do with our relationship with God.

You see, we worship a God who is beyond generous. When we were lost in sin – rebels and traitors - God gave his only son to save us. Jesus gave his life on the cross for a world that despised him. The only word for that is grace. Grace is the unmerited favor of God, given to people who least deserve it.

If you have received God's grace, it makes you gracious. Actually, I see that all the time in this church. Recently, a widow in our church had an old car she didn't need anymore. Instead of selling it, she donated it to another woman who desperately needed a vehicle. When she received the car, the woman wept for joy! It was beyond generous.



When our church adopted two families of Afghan refugees, they needed financial help to pay for food and housing. Without being asked, people in our church began giving! One family gave \$10,000. Another young couple gave \$1,000. It was beyond generous!

In July, when we sent a mission team to Kenya, we wondered if

we would have enough money to cover all of our expenses. Because of your generous giving, we actually had money left over! It was almost like the miracle of the loaves and fishes.

We worship a God who is beyond generous – who has given us life, salvation and every good gift. In what we give back to the LORD, may we be beyond generous.



Navigating the Dark Nights with Christ's Light

Each Sunday night, the high school students of Encounter gather in various homes, breaking into groups for guys and girls, delving into the riches of God's Word in what we call High School Discipleship.

Currently, our journey through Paul's Letter to the Philippians has been nothing short of transformative. Paul's deep affection for the Philippians is evident as he refers to them as $\acute{\alpha}\gamma\alpha\pi\eta \tau \acute{o}\varsigma$ (agapētos) - his loved ones. Like a proud spiritual father, Paul planted the seeds of faith in Philippi, witnessing their growth in the Lord even in his absence. Paul's desire for his spiritual



children is the same desire we share as parents and as a ministry—to witness our youth embracing their faith, making it their own, and obediently following Christ into the world.

The backdrop of the Philippians' story mirrors the challenges our youth face today. In a world increasingly hostile to declaring Jesus as Lord, unity becomes crucial. Paul, writing to a church facing persecution and internal division, imparts timeless wisdom on maintaining unity in the face of adversity. Unity, he acknowledges, becomes challenging when external pressures intensify. How do we find common ground when the world outside our community grows intimidating?

Paul directs our gaze to Jesus—the ultimate example of humility, sacrifice, and victory. The Philippians, amidst cultural hostility, are urged to look to Christ, reminding us that in today's anxiety-ridden world, we too, find our anchor in the same source. The world may be a scary place for our students, but at Encounter, we seek solace and guidance in the teachings of Paul, pointing us to the timeless truths found in the life of Jesus Christ.



The hymn of Philippians 2:5-11 tells the story of Christ—His nature, incarnation, death, resurrection, and glorification. It's a narrative that offers hope, purpose, and a model for facing the challenges of our time. Living a life of Christ means to embrace sacrifice and suffering. Our attitude towards one another must reflect the leadership of Jesus. As we dive into this scripture during our High School Discipleship, we hope to witness the transformation of anxiety into trust, fear into courage, and uncertainty into a steadfast faith.

In a world that often seems dark and foreboding, our students are discovering the illuminating power of Christ's teachings. Every Sun-

day night, they come together not just to study the Word but to apply it in their lives. In small groups, we unite, fortified by the lessons from Philippians, learning to navigate the challenges with Christ's light guiding our path.

Encounter Student Ministries at LPC is not just a gathering—it's a sanctuary where our youth discover the relevance of ancient truths in their modern lives. We invite you to join us in prayer for these young hearts, that they may continue to grow in faith, finding strength and unity in the Lord as they journey through the uncertainties of adolescence.

We are having a blast at WNT Kids and can't wait to discover our next clue!




Activating God Space

A.K.A. SHARING THE GOOD NEWS

This month Rachel Sachs offers a wonderful example of how patience and asking a good question can open a God Space door:

Born and raised in Switzerland, my husband, Daniel came from a home that was culturally Jewish but anti-religious, while intellect and classical music reigned supreme. When, as a young adult, he began to ask questions about the meaning of life, ultimately leading him to Jesus, his parents were shocked and dismayed. So, although we have been praying for the salvation of Daniel's Mama for years, even broaching the subject of faith or God can seem more challenging than climbing the Matterhorn.



This summer, something shifted. We were in Switzerland for our annual family visit and had planned to lead a weekend marriage retreat in next-door Germany. Friday morning Mama ended up being admitted to the hospital for a kidney infection. After much prayer, we felt that Daniel and kids should go as planned, while I would stay and keep Mama company.

On Saturday, she told me about her different neighbors. I so badly wanted to share about God or to pray with her, but I had the impression that I should keep silent. Presently, she talked about some Christian neighbors who had lovingly cared for her when she had the flu. "Then," she said, "they put their hands on me and just started praying. It was so weird that I've never spoken to them again." I realized that she would have freaked out if I had tried to pray with her.

On Sunday, after a video call with Daniel, she abruptly burst out with painful memories about his baptism years earlier. She denounced religious fanatics who read their Bibles all of the time. As I listened, I was praying like mad on the inside, asking God to please give me a good question. Finally, I got it and asked, "Mama, what was religion like in your home growing up?" After she finished sharing, she asked me about my childhood home. That was my invitation to briefly and carefully share about my Christian family, my wandering and desperate unhappiness, and the peace and joy I found when I eventually turned to God. This led to more talk of God and her acknowledgement that she knows He is out there because whenever she has prayed, help has always come.

On our last morning, we were up early praying for Mama. Daniel resolved to go see her one more time even though it was outside of visiting hours. They ended up having a tearful reconciliation and it seems that the door to her heart, formerly closed and locked against Christianity, is now ajar. When you think of us, please pray that Mama Sachs will hear Jesus calling and open her heart to His love and salvation.

Afghan Refugee Update

In April 2022, our church adopted two Aghan families who were among the 124,000 refugees airlifted out of Kabul. When we found them, they were living in a crowded hotel in Miami in very stressful and difficult conditions. We brought them to Lebanon and helped them start a new life here.

Since that time, the two families have come a long way. With help and support from our church, they have found jobs, learned English, started school, applied for permanent visas and received help applying for social services.

Both Samad Karimi and Mohammad Siddiqi have been employed at Walmart for a year, working afternoons and evenings. Their wives, Robia Karimi and Wahida Siddiqui, are working part-time in the mornings at a dry cleaners. Their employment has made them financially independent. Both of the men have received driver's licenses and have purchased a used car for driving to work.

Rashid Karimi is not old enough for school yet but learns from his family. Hamza Siddiqi thrived in Head Start and now is in Kindergarten. Ahmad Siddiqi and Rafat Karimi enjoyed Kindergarten and are now in first grade at Bowman Primary School. Mohammad Siddiqi (little Mohammad) completed third grade and is now

in fourth grade at Donovan School, where one of his teachers is Janet Terrell. Nahida Siddiqi completed 8th grade and is now in the 9th grade at Lebanon High School.

All of the children participated in the summer reading program at the Lebanon Public Library, reading 20 minutes each day to earn prizes. The children learn English at school through the ESL program. Volunteers, including several from LPC, have been teaching English to the adults.

Gradually, the Afghan families are adjusting to American culture. For Halloween, the children dressed up in costumes, carved pumpkins, and went trick-or-treating and to a hayride. For Thanksgiving, they cooked turkeys donated by LPC. At Christmas, they attended the Lebanon Horse Carriage Parade and the LPC Open House. For Mother's and Father's Day, the children made cards, baked cakes, and decorated t-shirts.

Our Afghan families are very grateful for all the love, support, and financial assistance they have received. In the words of Jesus, "For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat. I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink. I was a stranger and you invited me in" (Matthew 25:35).


