

Good News! The Gospel of Mark



eter was in prison again. This time, it was not going to end well. Herod had gotten violent with the followers of Jesus. He had just put James, the brother of John, to death, and he arrested Peter with the same intent in mind (Acts 12:1-5).

Then something miraculous happened. Peter was freed from his confinement. He ran to the first safe place he thought of— Mary's house! He knew the brothers and sisters would be there. It was their regular place of prayer, and it is in this home that we hear the name of Mary's son, the Gospel writer's name, for the first time— John Mark (Acts 12:12).

Marcus means "hammer." How fitting it is that God uses this man to hammer home the good news of Jesus! He is mentioned only 8 times in the New Testament, but those references give us a solid picture of a man who was used by God to spread the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ and to encourage the church.

Mark is the cousin of Barnabas (Colossians 4:10), who

was a leading man in the early church. It was Barnabas who had first believed Paul's conversion to be legitimate and who saw a faithful quality in his cousin, John Mark. Barnabas and Paul took John Mark with them on some of their missionary adventures (Acts 12:25, 13:5). Even after Mark inexplicably abandoned their mission (Acts 13:13), Barnabas didn't give up on his young cousin, which resulted in him and Paul parting ways (Acts 15:37-39).

Some time later, Paul is reminded of the qualities in Mark that Barnabas had seen. In one of the most touching verses of scripture, written toward the end of his life, Paul writes, "Luke alone is with me. Get Mark and bring him with you, for he is very useful to me for ministry" (2 Timothy 4:11). Mark came to Paul and worked alongside him as seen in Paul's salutations at the end of his letter to Philemon, verse 24.

As Luke was the faithful companion of Paul, who presumably stayed with Paul to the end, Mark became Peter's companion. In 1 Peter 5:13, Peter writes, "She

who is at Babylon, who is likewise chosen, sends you greetings, and so does Mark, my son." This is a reference to Peter and Mark in Rome, where Mark wrote down Peter's account of the ministry of Jesus which became the Gospel that bears his name. (As we study Mark, be aware of details revealed that only Peter could know.) One more thing: notice the term of endearment that Peter uses toward the younger Mark. He is his spiritual son in the faith. Their relationship in Jesus bears the fruit of the Gospel of Mark itself.

This school year, we will be walking with Jesus through the Gospel of Mark.

Why Mark? Because Mark has good news to tell. The best news, honestly. King Jesus has come, and he brings his kingdom with him. His kingdom is one of love and light and reconciliation and peace. All who belong to Jesus are a part of this kingdom and ambassadors of this kingdom. This will be significant for us to remember as we walk through another contentious election this fall.

Another reason to learn from Mark is that the Gospel of Jesus sets our hearts aflame and our feet to running. The Gospel of Mark is the gospel of immediacy— of action and of passion. The story is quick. Events are swift. Jesus and his followers are on the move and bringing the Kingdom to bear upon the earth. They act in obedience to Jesus,

Hosting Family Promise September 15-22 at FPWC

ome help us as we serve our families who find themselves temporarily homeless. We will be hosting the families September 15-22 at Warren County Family Promise (former Shaker Inn) in Lebanon, 600 Cincinnati Avenue.

Volunteers needed for the week:

DINNER COOKS (5:00-5:15 p.m.) LPC volunteers prepare an entrée when appropriate, side/vegetable/bread or dessert. At this time, we are asking that the meal be prepared at home and delivered to Family Promise Warren County. Dinner cooks can also host.

DINNER HOSTS (5:00-6:30 p.m.) - 4 people needed per day (can provide meals, dine with families & fellowship).

EVENING ACTIVITIES HOSTS (6:30-8 p.m.) - 4 people needed per day (crafts, playtime, activities with children as their parents attend training M-F).

OVERNIGHT HOSTS (7:30 p.m. - 6:30 a.m.)-2 people needed per day. Stay overnight in comfortable rooms.

SHOPPERS sign up for a grocery list of food that will be provided to the families for breakfast and lunch (signup available Sept 6).

Families are encouraged to serve together. All of these roles can be performed by a family. Feel free to sign up for two back-to-back roles, dinner and evening activities, or evening activities and overnight.

Thank you for your consideration. The many people who served the families in July had the same thing to say: "That was really fun," and "The new facility is amazing." Signups will be available in the Friday LPC Weekly Update starting August 30. This is an exciting opportunity to make a positive, face-to-face impact on the families that we are called to serve. We ended on a high note and talked about some of the things the kids were looking forward to this school year: the food at their new school (one child was really excited about the pizza), gym



Encounter Summer Camp: I Am Zacchaeus

As summer draws to a close and a new school year begins, our students at Lebanon Presbyterian Church had the opportunity to retreat from the busyness of their daily lives and encounter Jesus in a powerful way at our Encounter Student Ministries Summer Camp. From August 16th to 18th, our 7th to 12th graders gathered at Butler Springs Christian Camp in Highland County for a weekend filled with spiritual growth, fellowship, and unforgettable experiences.

This year's camp was intentionally planned to coincide with the start of the school year, a time when many of our students feel overwhelmed by the pressures of academic, social, and extracurricular expectations. In today's fast-paced world, it's easy for our students to fill every moment with entertainment, social media, and the constant buzz of their phones. These distractions, though entertaining, often leave them feeling emptier than before. As followers of Christ, we recog-

nize the importance of stepping away from these distractions to focus on our relationship with God. Just as Jesus frequently retreated to quiet places to pray (Luke 5:15–16, Mark 6:46, Luke 6:12–13, Luke 9:18, Matthew 14:13, Mark 1:35), we believe that our students, too, must follow His example to experience the fullness of God's blessings.

At Encounter Student Ministries, our mission is to help students encounter the living Christ through God's Word. This year's camp theme was centered on Luke 19:1-10, where Zacchaeus' life is transformed by an encounter with Jesus. Our theme, "I AM ZACCHAEUS," was a powerful reminder that we are all like Zacchaeus—broken, sinful, and in desperate need of a Savior. Through a series of talks, small group discussions, and reflective quiet times, our students explored how all relationships, and definitely with God, require both knowledge and proximity or to know who a person is and draw close to them. We learned that sin creates distance in our

relationships with God and others, and like fixing a broken friendship someone has to make the first move. God has made the first move to restore us through Jesus Christ.

One of the most impactful aspects of the weekend was the intentional disconnection from the outside world. With no cell phone service or Wi-Fi available at camp, our students were free to focus entirely on building relationships with one another and with Jesus. In a world where technology often dominates our attention, this was a refreshing and much-needed break.



The weekend was designed as a time to "climb the tree" like Zacchaeus, to intentionally seek out Jesus, and to experience the life-changing power of His presence.

Throughout the weekend, our students engaged in a variety of activities that reinforced the spiritual lessons they were learning. From crazy outdoor day and night games to small group and late-night discussions, every moment was an opportunity to grow closer to God and to each other. One of the highlights was the "Slow Club Quiet Time," 30-minute sessions of quiet prayer, scripture reading, and reflection and journaling. These sessions helped students build a personal relationship with God by providing space to listen and respond to His voice.

The culmination of the weekend was a powerful reminder that when Jesus moves into our lives, Jesus doesn't want you to clean up before he comes over; he wants you to be honest and tell him where the messed up places are. He doesn't just rearrange the furniture—He remodels the entire house. Just as Jesus transformed Zacchaeus, He brings transformation to us, taking on our messiness, our sins, and our brokenness, and making us new. We sometimes read the story in Luke 19 and think "how nice that Jesus fixed that bad guy" BUT — the message of the weekend was clear: we are all Zacchaeus, in need of the life-changing encounter that only Jesus can provide.

As we return to our daily routines, we are grateful for the support of our church family, who made this weekend possible through prayer, donations, and encouragement. Please continue to pray for our students as they carry the lessons and experiences of this weekend into the school year. Pray that they would remain rooted in their identity as beloved children of God and that they would be empowered to live out their faith in every area of their lives. We believe that to see Zacchaeus' transformation in this next generation we must go away to pray and to meet Jesus. And it may be helpful to go to a place with trees. Thank you, LPC, for being a part of this transformative journey. We look forward to seeing how God will continue to work in the lives of our students as they grow closer to Him.









































Why Didn't I say....?

As I get more comfortable with initiating spiritual conversations, there have been times when I have been surprised where the conversation went.

First example. When my friend said he used to go church but quit going when he moved. I shared that our minister said that the most common reason that people stop going to church is moving.

I encouraged my friend to search for a church. His comment was he really only used it to network, so not a big deal. Hmm, we are all on our own spiritual journey. I told him that I hoped that he would change his mind since God had blessed him so richly. Reflecting back, I turned to God Space by Doug Pollock. Doug suggests a reflective listening phrase such as "So, if I'm hearing you right, you attended church only to network?" Then as appropriate, Doug has many good follow-up questions:

Have you ever met anyone or experienced anything that made God seem real to you?

If God called you on your cell phone and gave you the opportunity to ask him one question, what would you ask him, and why?

What do you understand the core message of Christianity to be?

What do you find to be the most difficult thing to buy into when you consider the claims of Christianity?

The second example happened on a cruise. There was a crew member taking reservations. I saw a book about Buddhism by her workspace and asked if it was a good book. Her response was, "That is not my book, I'm holding it for a guest who left it." She was very shaken and seemed upset that I would think it was her book. My response was, "Oh, OK." Rewind. Why didn't I say something that could have helped me understand her better, like: "You seem a little anxious that anyone would think it's your book. What kind of books do you like?"

It's hard to keep questions in mind when someone blindsides me with a comment. I think the most important thing for me (us) to remember is to try to understand the person we are talking to. Then we are more likely to ask a question that gets to the heart of the matter.

A note on our Director of Worship and Music Search

Our hiring team has been working diligently to find our next Director of Worship and Music. It is safe to say that the process has been much slower than any of us had originally thought. We have received very few qualified candidates. As we continue to pray and prepare to meet the person the Lord is sending to us, here are a few updates we would like to share:

First, we have contracted with Celebration Ministry Staffing, which is a search firm that specializes in assisting churches like ours to find church musicians. They have an excellent history of matching musicians to churches, and we are confident that their network and experience will result in us meeting high-quality candidates more quickly.

Second, we have a volunteer interim choir director to lead the choir until a permanent director is found. Marlene Wilson has served as a church musician for decades and was the wife of a pastor who is now with the Lord. She relocated to Lebanon to live with her daughter and family. Marlene learned of our search and contacted us a few weeks ago to see if we needed any assistance while we were looking for a permanent director. What an answer to prayer!

You all will meet Marlene on Sunday, September 8, when the choir sings, but here she is in her own words of introduction:

"I'm excited to volunteer as your interim choir director. I grew up in Cincinnati and attended public school. About the time I was 7 or 8, the school offered piano lessons. I think Mom and Dad paid \$1.25 per lesson. We didn't have a piano, but my grandmother did. So many days after school, I would walk to my grandmother's house to practice.

I have always had a love for God and especially for the music of the church. As a young adult, I became very active in accompanying soloists, choirs and special groups. Music has been my passion since I can remember. I strive to continue expanding my knowledge by learning different styles and ways to communicate musically with praise and worship to God. Just a few of my favorite groups include Brooklyn Tabernacle, Prestonwood Baptist, Andrae Crouch, Casting Crowns, and I could go on.

It is my hope and desire to be used and my talents not wasted, so long as God gives me breath and strength. I look forward to what the Lord has in my future as I continue to serve Him.


The LPC Session took the following actions at our July 2024 Meeting
