O come, O come, Immanuel, and ransom captive Israel that mourns in lonely exile here until the Son of God appear.

Though I deeply need the season of Advent, I'm rarely ever prepared for it.

Most often, the first Sunday of Advent hits me like an out-of-body experience-- I can see myself suddenly singing ancient words of waiting and wrestling while I want to say to myself, "What are you doing? It was just Black Friday! You're not ready for this! Sales are on. Spend! Hang the lights! Get the tree up! Get going! Don't wait! Do more. Concerts. Open houses. Parties. Secret Santas. Schedule more gatherings. Go to more Christmas events. Don't miss out!"

Yet Advent says, "wait...prepare...watch...repent." These are things that work against the inertia of our frenetic existence. In a divided and depraved world, they help us slow down and remember our need for Jesus alone. Advent directs us to his deliverance and to his physical appearing that will make all things new again.

O come, O King of nations, bind in one the hearts of all mankind. Bid all our sad divisions cease and be yourself our King of Peace. I need Advent.

Advent is a season of preparation for the Messiah's coming. During Advent, we put ourselves in the place of the faithful Jews of the first century, who waited with eager expectation for God to act decisively to forgive sins, to free them from captivity, and end their exile.

O come, O Branch of Jesse's stem, unto your own and rescue them! From depths of hell your people save, and give them victory o'er the grave.

But our waiting isn't completely like theirs. Jesus Messiah has already come. We now wait in the hope of Messiah's return – Jesus' Second Coming, when he restores his creation.

O come, thou Dayspring from on high, and cheer us by thy drawing nigh; disperse the gloomy clouds of night, and death's dark shadows put to flight.

How do we prepare for Jesus' coming?

This Advent, we ponder passages from the prophet Isaiah and the Gospel of Matthew. Each scripture paints a picture of the reign of the King of Glory, the Messiah Jesus, and reminds us of how we are to prepare for His in-breaking glory. One common word we see is "Repent!" We would do well to practice this command as we prepare for Jesus' coming.

Wait.

Breathe.

Wrestle.

Repent.

Already and not yet.

Deliverance has come and is not yet fulfilled. Rejoice! Rejoice! Immanuel has come to thee! This is Advent.

And I need Advent.

I need to wait on the One who is coming again. I need to wrestle and repent of my selfish ways that fall so short of His glory.

I need to rest in his promises that are true and one day will be fulfilled when He makes all things new.

I need Advent. How about you?

Parenting is Wild!

amilies are watching The Wild Robot, an adventure film about nature, technology, and oddly enough—parenting. The Wild Robot was first a science fiction novel aimed at children and teenagers. Its central premise revolves around a sophisticated, Al-powered droid who gets shipwrecked on an island inhabited only by animals. After a terrible accident, the droid who comes to be known as Roz. becomes the sole caretaker of an orphaned newborn gosling named Brightbill. With the help of a sly fox, a wry possum, and an ensemble of other creatures, the robot embarks on the task of raising Brightbill to "eat, swim, fly." The film's slow, meditative pacing makes up for its somewhat predictable plot, and themes of sacrifice, forgiveness, and gratitude are prominent throughout. Though Roz is just a robot, the character's determination to protect and provide brings up plenty of human emotion.

Most teens don't need us to serve their immediate physical needs in the way they did when they were small. Their baby spoons languish in the back of the silverware drawer like artifacts from another era, and the buoyant swimming safety vests from their toddler years have been deflating, slowly, in the attic. All that's left is the final challenge: teaching them to fly.

We might build them a runway, find them the best mentors, and teach them everything we know. But we can't fly for them—even if we wish we could.

When Roz calculates the enormity of the task of raising a baby animal, she blurts out, "I do not have the programming to be a mother!" A nearby possum named Pinktail, who happens to be carrying her own seven babies on her back, replies with the wisdom of a more seasoned parent: "No one does. We just make it up."

By the time our kids are teenagers, most of us have felt like Roz in this scene—ill-equipped, unprepared, and like we are the wrong person for the job. Many of us have probably also felt like

Pinktail—weathered, agile, and used to improvising.

It is true that Roz is not well-prepared for the task she calls "eat, swim, fly." It is also true that she must learn to be flexible and adapt to unforeseen circumstances. But she commits wholly to her gosling charge. And this act of devotion, along with some willingness to get creative, transforms her abilities. It wasn't the task she was expecting. But that doesn't mean she wasn't made for it.

Parenthood is a divine calling. We don't inherit it by accident. God designs families with every one of our strengths and weaknesses in mind. He knows us intimately, and He loves us unfathomably. As it says in Psalm 33:11, "The plans of the Lord stand firm forever, the purposes of His heart through generations."

We love our teens hard, and then they go. We watch them taking off from runways that cost us everything to build. But even when it feels like they're flying into a land of uncertainty that we have never laid eyes on, they are held within God's perfect plan built from ever-knowing, everlasting love.


Here's a sneak peek at what's in store:

Thank you so much for helping WNT Kids with their OCC Mission. Through your generous support, we were able to pack over 200 boxes at the November 13th session of WNT Kids.

Operation Christmas Child is a mission led by Samaritan's Purse. They deliver the Good News of Jesus Christ to children in need around the world by using gift-filled shoeboxes. Each box packed full of quality toys, school supplies, and personal care items becomes a tangible expression of God's immense love for the child. For many, it is their first gift ever!

Delivered by their local church partners, shoebox gifts also provide an opportunity to present the Gospel to children in a clear, child-friendly way. Since 2009, over 40.5 million shoebox recipients have participated in the 12-lesson discipleship course, *The Greatest Journey*, and more than 20.2 million children have made decisions for Christ. On Nov. 13, the children, who had already learned about OCC and had prepared cards and homemade gifts for the boxes, worked together to pack over 200 shoeboxes. They prepared the boxes with love and then prayed for the children who would receive them. The children were so excited to put what they had been studying about, the Great Commission and sharing the Gospel, into action. It was a high-energy, Holy Spirit-filled, wondrous night!

Children from our very own Cub Pack 436, who had packed a considerable number of shoeboxes ahead of time, also came to WNT Kids and helped pack our shoeboxes. They then placed the shoeboxes in a couple of key locations to get them ready for more prayer from the church family on the following Sunday. Keep On Sowing

In this column we talk a lot about planting seeds – meaning small bits about God or (ideally) scripture that might encourage someone to think about God. Pastor Jeff talked about seeds in his sermon on November 3 regarding Mark 4:1-34 (the parable of the sower). Here are some thoughts about sowing seeds that we gleaned:

People will only hear and understand the Word if they have ears to hear - in other words, if their heart is open. We have no control over that so we should sow the seed anyway!

The more we hear the Word of God, the more our light will shine and the more we will reflect God. We need to hide the Word in our hearts (Psalm 119:11) so that we can share it readily, embrace it, and memorize it.

The size of the seed has nothing to do with its power. So, even if we only have the opportunity to sow a small seed for thought, it could still be powerful. We don't know what God might do with it.

Only God will make the seed grow, and here's what God says about his Word – "It will not return to me empty, but will accomplish what I desire and achieve the purpose for which I sent it." (Isaiah 55:11)

I asked a couple of my grandchildren, who don't know God if I could send them a scripture verse every day to encourage them (I get this sent to me from a radio station and forward it). They don't generally acknowledge the texts I send, so I thought maybe I should just stop. But then I got a text from one of them that said, "...I've been reading them every day and some of them have come at just the time they needed to." I don't know how God is using these scriptures, but now I know he is!

I just want to encourage you to sow the seed anyway, even if you can't see it growing!

Father, help us to love people so much that we have to share the Good News.


DANIEL THE PROPHET


